This photo represents the theme of Belonging. The taller of the two mushrooms fought to grow between these deck boards, despite the possibilities of being trampled or plucked away, drawing moisture into the wood and thus forcing it to give way for its roots to find footing. The taller mushroom grappled with other organisms also trying to find their place to flourish, creating an environment where the smaller mushroom could find its space to grow in the protection of its paragon. This photograph represents having someone who fought to find their place, someone to look up to who stands tall and strong where they are, who exudes a sense of belonging even if it is apparent that they haven't always been where they are now, someone who never folded in the face of difficulty or disadvantage. The taller mushroom portrays someone who knows the struggle of finding one's place in the world and who now stands as a role model to inspire others to follow in finding their unfettered sense of belonging, wherever that may be.






ABHAY JEET SINGH KALSI
