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## An Introduction to the UDL Framework

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Universal Design for Learning is based on the architectural concept of **universal design**, which seeks to ensure that built environments be used to the greatest extent possible by as many people as possible. Just like universal design asserts that people with a variety of different access needs can and should fully participate in public space, UDL assumes the same for learning spaces, materials, and experiences. However, by proactively removing barriers to learning for individuals with disabilities we are also supporting a whole diversity of learners. In fact, everyone has a variable learning profile. We have strengths and we have challenges. Sometimes it is related to context (as mentioned the previous [UDL Xchange feature](#)).

Frequently, we tend to evaluate students using a statistical mean, which, in turn, causes us to overlook the unique abilities and potential within our community. The concept of the "jagged learning profile," as coined by [Todd Rose](#), sheds light on the significance of individuality. It highlights the necessity of creating adaptable environments that can cater to the diverse needs of everyone involved. By prioritizing the design of educational settings for those on the periphery, we unlock the full capabilities and potential of each individual.

UDL is a framework created by **CAST** for teaching and learning that sheds light on the wide variety of dimensions of learning. CAST provides a [graphic matrix](#), which is organized by three areas: **1)** the principles, **2)** the guidelines, and **3)** the check-points.

The principles of Engagement, Representation, and Action & Expression name the three overarching groups. Each Principle has 3 guidelines and each of the 9 guidelines have checkpoints (or strategies) to consider when designing learning spaces, materials, and experiences.
