What are the Top 100 Ed Tech Tools Used by Teachers Around the World? Read Jane Hart's Annual Survey Results to Find Out.

I first discovered Jane Hart's "Top 100 List" by accident.

I was looking for a comprehensive database of ed tech tools that I could share with others who wanted to find different ways to refresh their teaching. I soon realized that the "Top 100 List" provided valuable insight into how other teachers around the world

were adapting to the trends in technology and also how tech-enabled teaching has been changing over the years.

One of the standout features of Hart's list is its breadth. It encompasses a wide range of tools, from content creation platforms to communication and collaboration apps. It is a great place to start if you are looking for ways to foster engagement in your classes, streamline your workflow, or facilitate remote learning.

The process of compiling the list is simple. Each year, Hart sends out a survey through her social media channels (33,000 followers on Twitter!) that simply asks people which ed tech tools they're using. Over 2,000 people responded to this year's survey, literally from all over the world. And because it's updated annually, readers can get insight into the newest tools out there.

This year's list has just come out. Readers will find familiar favourites like PowerPoint and YouTube, which has maintained its #1 standing for eight consecutive years. But this year's list also includes ChatGPT for the first time. Hart writes that "2023 is the year AI has finally taken off," with ChatGPT jumping straight into the #4 spot. Its high rank might be an indication that more and more teachers are using the AI platform to support their teaching rather than seeing it as a nemesis that undermines it.

There are some interactive elements on her website as well. By using the search function on Hart's Top 100 website, readers can see how particular tools have fared in previous years of the survey. For example, Twitter was the number one teaching and learning tool from 2009 to 2015, falling out of the top 10 only last year. Hart also categorizes tools from her list, which can make it easier for educators to navigate and explore options that align with their goals.
