Academic Upgrading is a program for English-speaking adults who need to upgrade their communications, math and science skills in order to prepare for college level post-secondary programs, apprenticeship or employment.

Communications courses are offered at the following levels of study:

- Foundations
- Pre-ACE
- ACE (Academic and Career Entrance, Grade 12C equivalent course for college admission purposes)

Math courses are offered at the following levels of study:

- ACE Workplace Math
- ACE Business Math (Grade 12C equivalent course for college admission purposes)
- ACE Apprenticeship Math (Grade 12C equivalent course for college or Apprenticeship admission purposes)
- ACE Technology Math (Grade 12C equivalent course for college admission purposes)

Science Courses (Physics, Chemistry, Biology) are offered only at the ACE level for college admission purposes.

The Academic Upgrading program also offers academic and vocational counselling. Program length varies for each student according to their beginning level, their goals and their progress.

This program has intake throughout the year. Prospective students participate in an assessment of reading and writing skills to determine academic preparedness for participation.

Students begin the program with a three-week orientation to determine their appropriate upgrading class level, and create a learning goal plan. Applicants not fluent in English may be referred to an English as a Second Language program.

Students may be eligible for a transportation allowance.

There are no fees. This program is funded by the Employment Ontario branch of the Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities.

Augmented Education¹ is a training and employment support model developed by George Brown College and the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health (CAMH). The **Construction Craft Worker Foundations** program is



one of two Augmented Education² programs currently offered at George Brown College.

The goal of the program is to help people with a history of mental illness and/or addiction take the first steps toward a job in Toronto's construction industry. There are no fees for this program.

This innovative program includes classroom and construction lab instruction, 160 hours of work placement, and workshops.

Class and construction lab time is approximately 30 to 35 hours per week, with support and tutoring available from program coaches.

PROGRAM STANDARDS AND LEARNING OUTCOMES

The graduate has reliably demonstrated the ability to:

1. Select, use and operate safely the tools and equipment used by construction craft workers and carpenters, masons, brick layers and other construction related trades.
2. Select and apply appropriate material types for use in new residential/commercial construction and renovation.

3. Interpret and apply relevant information in the Ontario Building Code and Occupational Health and Safety Act regulations for Construction Projects (CSAO) as they relate to construction craft worker duties and the construction industry in general.
4. Identify unsafe conditions and take appropriate action on a job site.
5. Interpret and visualize a finished project from an orthographical projected drawing.
6. Apply construction processes to residential/commercial construction and common types of renovations.
7. Solve construction-related problems using appropriate techniques in a variety of construction situations.
8. Select, use and operate appropriate welding equipment (and gas) in order to exhibit proper metal cutting techniques and procedures.
9. Apply basic emergency scene management and administer basic first aid needs on job work site.

Augmented Education¹ is a training and employment support model developed by George Brown College and the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health (CAMH). The Culinary Skills program is one of two Augmented Education² programs currently offered at George Brown College.

This employment-focused program offers people with a history of mental illness and/or addiction, who see work as part of the recovery process, the choice and the opportunity to receive training and employment in the food service industry.

The goal of the program is to help people recovering from addiction and/or mental illness take the first steps toward a job in Toronto's food service industry. There are no fees for this program.

This innovative program includes classroom and kitchen lab instruction, 150 hours of work placement, and workshops.

Class and kitchen lab time is approximately 30 to 35 hours per week, with support and tutoring available from program coaches.





PROGRAM STANDARDS AND LEARNING OUTCOMES

The graduate has reliably demonstrated the ability to:

1. Provide fundamental culinary preparation and presentation for a variety of food service environments using a range of classical and contemporary techniques.
2. Apply basic food and bake science to food preparation to create a desired end product.
3. Contribute to and monitor adherence of others to the provision of a well-maintained kitchen environment and to the service of food and beverage products that are free from harmful bacteria or other contaminants, adhering to health, safety, sanitation and food handling regulations.
4. Ensure the safe operation of the kitchen and all aspects of food preparation to promote healthy work spaces and the responsible, efficient use of resources.
5. Support the development of menu options that reflect knowledge of nutrition and food ingredients, promote general health and well-being, respond to a range of nutritional needs and preferences, and address modifications for special diets, food allergies and intolerances, as required.
6. Apply fundamental business principles and recognized industry costing and control practices to food service operations to promote a fiscally responsible operation.
7. Apply basic knowledge of sustainability, ethical and local food sourcing, and food security to food preparation and kitchen management, recognizing the potential impacts on food production, consumer choice and operations within the food service industry.
8. Use technology, including contemporary kitchen equipment, for food production and promotion.
9. Perform effectively as a member of a food and beverage preparation and service team and contribute to the success of a food-service operation by applying self-management and interpersonal skills.
10. Develop strategies for continuous personal and professional learning to ensure currency with and responsiveness to emerging culinary techniques, regulations, and practices in the food service industry.

Each of these programs reserves a limited number of seats per intake for Pre-Health Sciences Pathway to Certificates and Diplomas graduates who meet certain conditions (such as a minimum grade point average for the program or minimum grades in specific courses) upon graduation from Pre-Health Sciences Pathway to Certificates and Diplomas. Admission to some of these programs is highly competitive.

Students who intend to apply to any other post-secondary program at George Brown College or at another institution should check the admission requirements for the program. Graduates of Pre-Health Sciences Pathway to Certificates and Diplomas may also apply for elective credit and exemptions for courses in those programs.

Applicants are selected on the basis of their academic achievement, including the required courses, and any other selection criteria outlined below.

- Ontario Secondary School Diploma or equivalent**
- Grade 12 English (C or U)

Mature Students may take the Admissions Assessment for English¹⁵, OR may consider upgrading to achieve the credit (s) needed in English¹⁶.
