About You

- You're committed to helping children and youth at risk- it's more than a job, it's a commitment that will impact change.
- You're an empathetic people person with great social skills who builds trust and rapport easily.
- You're consistent, reliable and able to set and enforce boundaries you say what you mean and mean what you say.
- You enjoy working with diverse groups of people and have good radar for identifying human rights and diversity related concerns.



Are you ready?

- To be responsible in all your in-class and field-based work. That includes communicating clearly and behaving with appropriate professionalism.
- The Child and Youth Care program has an intensive class workload and placement schedule. We recommend you do not exceed 15 hours per week of part-time work outside the program.
- To establish and maintain ongoing communication with faculty members. This will facilitate your success in the program and help ensure that you receive placement opportunities that are matched to your area of interest.

Did you know?

- In this program potentially difficult issues such as child abuse, neglect and addiction are discussed. You need to be able to compartmentalize any personal experience you have and apply concepts to your work in a professional manner. The college offers an extensive network of supports.
- If you have an Individual Education Plan (IEP) or require other accommodations, you must connect with Accessible Learning Services at the beginning of your studies in order for your instructors to integrate your learning need. The program co-ordinator can help you with this process.

Program Highlights

- There are two completion streams for advanced diploma candidates: C133 (3 years of full-time study) or C143 (fast-track: 16 consecutive months of intensive study for candidates with a previous postsecondary degree). Both streams include 2 mandatory field placements at full-time hours 4 days/week for 4 months each.
- All our courses supplement a theoretical framework with applied or case-based in-class learning.
